

The Light of the Nations

For centuries, Israel waited for the prophecy of Isaiah to be fulfilled. They looked for the day when the thick darkness covering the earth would lift, and the glory of the Lord would rise upon Jerusalem. They anticipated the caravans of camels and the dromedaries of Midian, bringing gold and frankincense to praise the Lord.

In today's Gospel, that waiting ends, but the fulfillment is far greater than a political victory. The light does not shine on a palace in earthly Jerusalem, but upon a child in a humble house. The Magi, the first fruits of the Gentile nations, follow the star to the true Light of the World.

This is the "mystery" St Paul speaks of in his letter to the Ephesians. The Epiphany reveals that the Gentiles are no longer strangers or sojourners. They are co-heirs, members of the same body, and copartners in the promise. The covenant family of God has burst the boundaries of one nation to embrace the whole world.

We are the successors of those wise men. We, too, are called to journey from the shadow of the world into the radiant light of His presence. Like them, we must not appear before the Lord empty-handed. We offer Him the gold of our charity, the frankincense of our prayer, and the myrrh of our daily sacrifices. We find Him not in a manger, but on the altar, where the glory of the Lord has truly risen upon us.

Sharing Christ's Light


What is the one thing we are all searching for? Ultimately, we are searching for God, complete fulfillment, happiness, truth, goodness, peace, love, relationship and security. Sometimes though, we look for these things in the wrong places, expecting other people or elements of creation to supply this longing and desire for ultimate fulfillment.

Today's feast, Epiphany, is a bookend to our celebration of Jesus' birth at Christmas, both are intimately connected. At Christmas we celebrate God becoming human in Jesus, today we celebrate the true divinity of that human person - Jesus, the Christ, the Saviour. Both are two sides of the same coin.

Today's readings lead us to recognise that Jesus, born in Bethlehem and revered by the Magi, is indeed God, the one for whom we have been searching. Countless people through the centuries, through coming to believe in him, have found the peace, joy, fulfilment and life for which they have been searching. Even our own community continues to grow as people come to us, looking for the love of Jesus in their lives.

As Church, we are Christ's body - his visible and physical presence in the world today. God continues to reveal himself through the body of his Son - us, the Church. Our invitation therefore, is to consider how we, individually and as a community, can be that attractive light for others, drawing all people together into his body. As in our vision and mission - coming to know, follow and share Jesus so that our neighbourhoods will be transformed by his love and power through the Holy Spirit.

Thoughts from Pope Leo

Reflecting on Church teaching, Pope Leo reminds us 'that the Church is the visible sign of the union between God and humanity, where God intends to bring us all together into one family of brothers and sisters and make us his people.'

Such 'mystery of ecclesial communion,' he says, helps us to understand the need to become a more synodal Church, 'recognising that truth is not possessed, but sought together.'

As the Pope points out, the Church is called to be a place 'where relationships do not respond to the logic of power but to that of love.' Ours is a Church where a child in a humble manger shows up the absurd claims of the earth's most powerful rulers.

Indeed, as the Pope stresses, 'the spiritual life... reveals to us that we are all children of God, brothers and sisters, called to serve one another.' 'The supreme rule in the Church is love,' the Pope emphasises. 'No one is called to dominate; all are called to serve. No one should impose his or her own ideas; we must all listen to one another. No one is excluded; we are all called to participate. No one possesses the whole truth; we must all humbly seek it and seek it together.'

The gifts of the Magi

The astrologers in the Magi story went through quite a journey in search of the baby Jesus. They obviously believed in him and had faith in the star.

Have you ever 'followed a star'? Have you ever gone after a dream or an ideal you believed in? Are you still going after it? What gives you the energy to keep going? How do you know it is worth it?

The gifts brought by the Magi have significance.

Gold is a symbol of wealth and fidelity.

Frankincense is burned to purify the atmosphere by releasing an aromatic and pleasing smell. For centuries, indigenous people in many countries have burned smoke in order to bless and purify themselves, and monks have watched incense rise to the sky as a symbol of their prayers ascending to God.

Myrrh is a kind of resin or oil used for anointing and embalming. It is a symbol of comfort and soothing (who doesn't enjoy a rubdown?) but it is also a foreshadowing of death.

How were these gifts symbolic for Jesus? What three gifts would be symbolic of you and your life so far?

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
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
