

READINGS NEXT WEEK – Fourth Sunday in the Year (A)

Zephaniah 2:3; 3:12-13; I Corinthians 1:26-31; Matthew 5:1-12

History Redeemed

Isaiah's prophecy in today's First Reading is quoted by Matthew in today's Gospel. Both intend to recall the apparent fall of the everlasting kingdom promised to David.

Eight centuries before Christ, that part of the kingdom where the tribes of Zebulun and Naphtali lived was attacked by the Assyrians, and the tribes were hauled off into captivity.

It marked the beginning of the kingdom's end. The Davidic empire finally crumbled in the sixth century BC, when Jerusalem was seized by Babylon and the remaining tribes were driven into exile.

Isaiah prophesied that Zebulun and Naphtali, the lands first to be degraded, would be the first to see the light of God's salvation. Jesus today fulfills that prophecy—announcing the restoration of David's kingdom at precisely the spot where the kingdom began to fall.

His gospel of the Kingdom includes not only the twelve tribes of Israel but all the nations—symbolized by the "Galilee of the Nations." Calling His first disciples, two fishermen on the Sea of Galilee, He appoints them to be "fishers of men," gathering people from the ends of the earth.

They are to preach the gospel, Paul says in today's Epistle, to unite all peoples in the same mind and in the same purpose—in a worldwide kingdom of God.

By their preaching, Isaiah's promise has been delivered. A world in darkness has seen the light. The yoke of slavery and sin, borne by humanity since time began, has been smashed.

And we are able now, as we sing in today's Psalm, to dwell in the house of the Lord, to worship Him in the land of the living.

A Change of Heart

How would you describe your life? Our lives are usually a mix of good and wonderful elements along with areas of darkness and struggle. It's often easy to focus simply on the good parts, or at times fall into despair thinking that the struggles and darkness will never be resolved.

In today's gospel Jesus is revealed as the one who brings light into the darkness. Jesus comes curing disease and illness, calling people to follow him, responding to his invitation to 'repent, for the kingdom of God is close at hand'.

This call to repentance is primarily a 'change of heart or mind'. He is inviting us to change our minds—to recognise that indeed, he has the power to relieve us from our darkness, shed the light of truth, hope, freedom and peace into the troubled and darkened areas of our lives.

Would you like him to do this for you? If so, here is a prayer of surrender you might pray as you prepare to celebrate the Eucharist and partake in his body and blood.

Dear Jesus, you are the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. I forgive all those who have hurt me. I offer you my sinful behaviour of _____. I give you permission to take my sin away from me, along with all the behaviours that are associated with it. As I receive your very body and blood in the Eucharist I surrender and unite myself with you and ask for healing through your Holy Spirit. Amen.

Where Does Light Shine First?

When Jesus began his public ministry, he didn't set up headquarters in Jerusalem among the religious elite. He went to Galilee—the region everyone looked down on. "Galilee of the Gentiles," they called it dismissively. It was mixed, marginalised, the first to fall when enemies invaded. Not the place you'd expect God's light to shine.

But that's exactly the point. Isaiah prophesied it: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light." The darkest place. The most despised region. That's where God's light dawned first.

Jesus called his first disciples there—not scholars or priests, but fishermen. Working-class guys pulling nets from the lake. "Follow me," he said. And immediately, they left everything and followed.

Our readings today challenge two assumptions we often make:

First, we assume God works through the **right** people in the **right** places. But God consistently chooses the unlikely, the overlooked, the ordinary. If you think you're too broken or too ordinary to be used by God, you're exactly who Jesus is looking for.

Second, we assume Christian unity is about agreeing on everything. But Paul tells the divided Corinthians: your unity isn't based on following the same human leader or preferring the same style. It's based on Christ. Just Jesus. "Is Christ divided?" he asks. If not, why are we?

This week, ask yourself: Where are the **Galilees** in my world—the places and people everyone else has written off? That's where Jesus would be. Go there. Bring light there. Because God's light always shines first in the darkest places.



A vocation view

Jesus began his mission in the marketplace, not the temple. He calls us from our daily work. Are you willing to drop your nets and trade your current path for the adventure of priesthood or consecrated life?
